There are several pros and cons of Artificial Intelligence. A few of the benefits include: speech recognition- AI can automatically convert spoken speech into written text and AI can translate written and/or spoken word from one language into another; image recognition- AI can recognize, identify, and categorize various aspects of an image: and cybersecurity- AI can autonomously scan networks for cyber attacks and threats.

Self-Regulation

In almost every classroom today you can find at least one student who has difficulty with self-regulation. Self-regulation refers to self-control and the ability to cope with difficult situations. The lack of self-regulation causes problems in the classroom. A child who has a tantrum, yells or even hits other children out of frustration probably won't be liked by their peers, and may face discipline at school. These students may not have the capacity to learn and fall behind, as well as have a negative impact on the other students in their classroom.

How do problems with self-regulation develop? They could start early, such as an infant being neglected. A child who does not feel safe and secure, or who is unsure whether their needs will be met, may have trouble self-soothing and self-regulating. Later, a child, teen, or adult may struggle with self-regulation, either because this ability was not developed during childhood, or because of a lack of strategies for managing difficult feelings such as frustration. Over time this could lead to even more serious issues such as mental health disorders and risky behaviors such as substance use. The ability of children to control their impulses is a key factor in long-term success.

How do we help children who are not able to self-regulate develop the ability to do so? The years between ages 6 and 12 are considered a key time for intervention and prevention, as this age group is considered to be the most responsive to self-control strategies. Most kids should have emotional regulation skills by the time they are 8 or 9.

Research shows that spending just a few minutes a day working on these skills can make a difference.

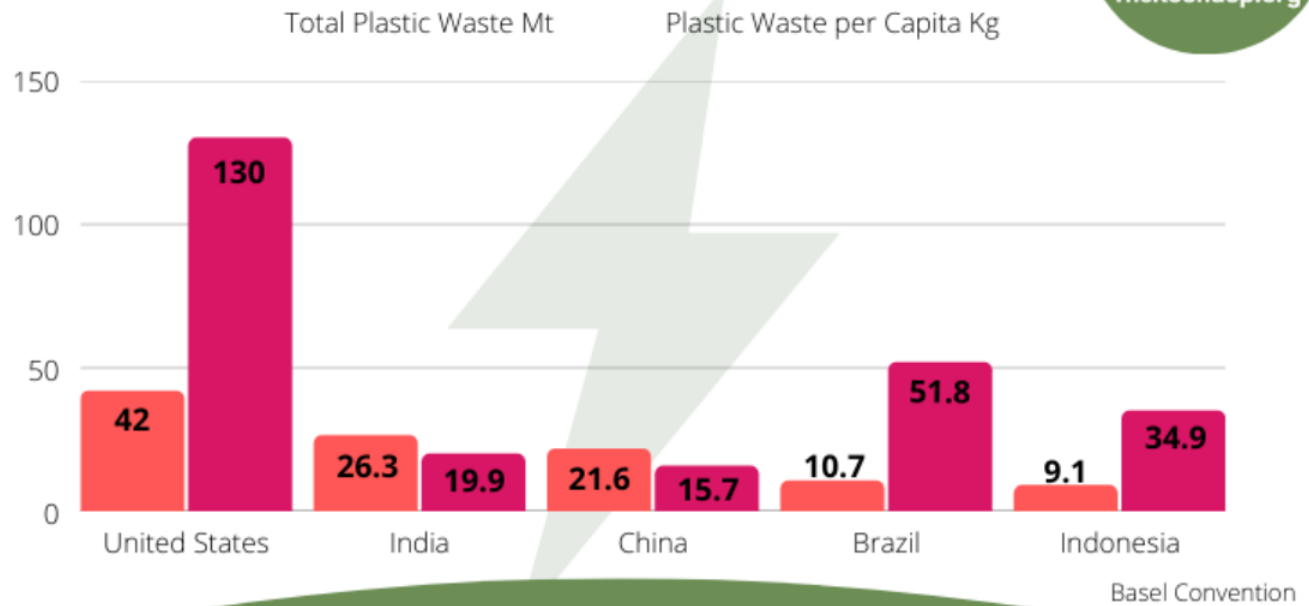

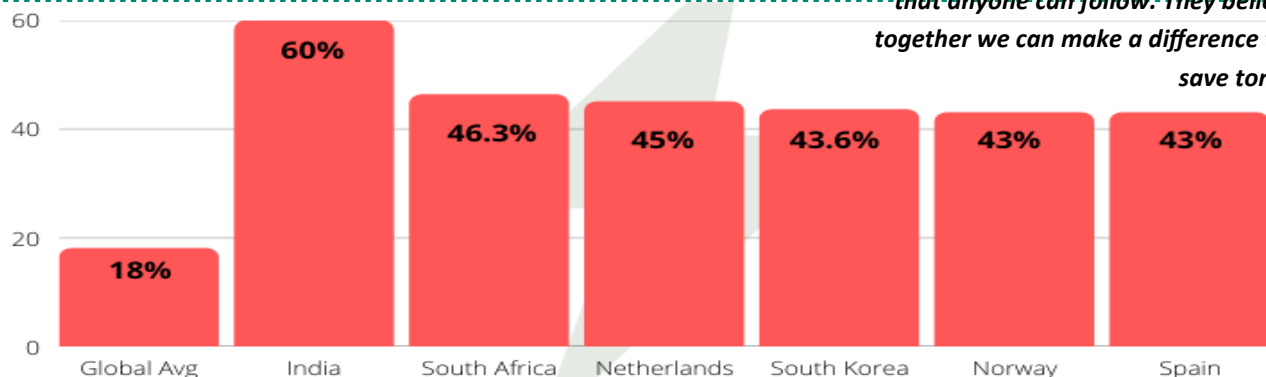

- * **10 Million Tons** of plastic per year end up in the ocean.
- * **China is the world's largest plastic-producing country** with a 32% share of global production.

- * **50 billion plastic water bottles** are sold each year in the US.
- * On average, just **18% of plastic** is collected for recycling.

Countries with the Best PLASTIC RECYCLING RATE



Solving the problem of plastic waste and pollution is a complex, complicated, and huge undertaking. Since 1950, when plastics began to be mass-produced, the world has manufactured over 9 billion metric tons of plastic. Of this, just 600 million tons (a little over 6.5%) has been recycled, and just 200 million tons of that is still in use. More than half the plastic ever produced (5 billion tons) has gone to waste.

According to the article 25 Jaw-Dropping Plastic Waste Statistics in 2023 by Arabella Ruiz at TheRoundup, an unbelievable **46% of plastic waste** comes from **packaging**. This includes containers such as bottles, pots, tubs and trays, or wrappings such as plastic shopping bags, rubbish bags, bubble wrap, or shrink wrap. These are the areas in which our choices as individuals can have a massive effect.

Coca-Cola and **PepsiCo** are the companies that use the most plastic packaging. **Coca-Cola** uses 2.9 million metric tons of plastic packaging a year. In early 2022 **Coca-Cola** announced a new goal supporting its *World Without Waste* global sustainable packaging strategy. By 2030, 25% of its global product volume will be served to consumers in reusable packaging. Reusable packaging options include returnable bottles and refillable cups for fountain dispensers. Returnable glass and plastic bottles are a top priority in countries with established reuse infrastructures and supply chains, as in Africa, Europe and Latin America. In North America dispensed drinks are sold in places like restaurants, music and sports venues, and movie theaters. Refillable cups represent a big opportunity to reduce single-use waste and limit the use of new materials. **Coca-Cola** has several reusable packaging pilots in North America, including a new partnership with **r.Cup** (<https://rcup.com/>). **r.Cups** can be used up to hundreds of times with proper handling and sanitization and then upcycled at the end of their lifecycle. According to their website, in 2022 **PepsiCo** used about 2.6 million metric tons of plastic to package beverages and convenient food products, including their primary, secondary and tertiary packaging. In early 2022, PepsiCo Europe announced that by 2030, it aims to eliminate fossil-based plastic in all its crisp and chip bags, reducing greenhouse gas emissions from film packaging for food by up to 40%. Across 22 global markets, **PepsiCo** changed several brands' packaging to 100% rPET (recycled polyethylene terephthalate) plastic. There are plans to convert all Pepsi-branded products in the U.S. to 100% rPET bottles by 2030 and **PepsiCo** has entered into an agreement with the Eastman company to build a new plant to supply recycled (rPET) made from materials that would otherwise go to landfill. Once operating, it is expected to have an annual output capacity of more than 150,000 tons of rPET. **PepsiCo** also supports collection and recycling systems across the globe. <https://www.pepsico.com/our-impact/esg-topics-a-z/packaging#progress>

We need to hold companies accountable for improving the amount of plastic in their packaging. As you purchase, look at the packaging. Then think about buying products that are **zero-waste**. A product is zero waste if it's something you actually need and you will use it every day. Making items you use regularly as eco-friendly as possible helps to increase their sustainability because they're used often so the money you spend on them is worth it. On the other hand, buying an item that's eco-friendly and sustainable but sits in a cupboard without being used actually collects waste instead of prevents it. A product is zero waste if its lifespan can be extended. Double-duty products are the best reusable items if you want to be zero waste. A product is zero waste if you don't cause an environmental problem when disposing of it. This is where disposing of the product correctly and in earth-friendly ways becomes extremely important. Disposing of it could include recycling it, such as in the case of glass, or putting it in the compost pile without worrying about chemicals leaking into the soil. By choosing eco-friendly, zero-waste and/or non-plastic alternatives, we can all help do something to reduce plastic amount of waste.

Little Free Library

In my neck of the woods you see quite a few of these. They are called Little Free Libraries and according to their website, there are 150,000 Little Free Libraries in 120 countries that have shared over 300 million books.



Little Free Library is a nonprofit organization based in St. Paul, Minnesota. Little Free Library book-sharing boxes are open seven days a week, 24 hours a day and are freely accessible to all, removing barriers to book access. Their mission is “to be a catalyst for building community, inspiring readers, and expanding book access for all through a global network of volunteer-led Little Free Library book-exchange boxes”. Maybe you are interested in becoming the librarian of your own Little Free Library. You can find plans for construction at the website or even purchase a prebuilt box. Think about the height and depth of the shelves, especially if you are going to have children’s books or hardcover adult books. Also it needs to be placed somewhere that is accessible to someone pulling up in a car or walking. You will be responsible for keeping the library in good condition and rotating books in and out. Mix It Up at Lunch Day is an international campaign that encourages students to identify, question, and cross social boundaries. Schools can host a Mix It Up event on any day of the year! Students consistently identify the cafeteria as a place in their school where divisions are clearly—and harshly—drawn. So students are asked to move out of their comfort zones and connect with someone new over lunch. It’s a simple act with profound implications that educators are encouraged to include in year-round efforts to promote healthy, welcoming school environments. Studies have shown that interactions across group lines can help reduce prejudice. When students interact with those who are different from them, biases and misperceptions can fall away.
